

# ***There Will Be No More Night Discussion Guide***

*How to Use this Guide: The discussion questions are listed after a brief summary of information about the film. If you watched the film with a group, use these questions to guide a conversation about the film. If you watched it alone, write down your answers to these questions to reflect on the film.*

## Summary

An intense documentary about the tremendous tension between observation and interpretation. The pilots and gunners of attack helicopters who carry out nighttime missions in war zones make decisions with far-reaching consequences, not only for their targets, but for themselves as well; the fear of making a mistake is ever-present. What begins as a monotone video essay gradually develops a powerful tension, because as viewers we find ourselves in the pilot's seat. Country: France. Themes: modern warfare.

## First Impressions

1. In a few words, how did the film make you feel?
2. What aspects of the film surprised you? What aspects of the film were familiar?
3. Was there a moment in the film that you found particularly inspiring or disturbing? What was it about that moment that moved you?

## Reflection

1. Why did the filmmaker choose to interview a pilot during the film? What perspective did it offer?
2. How would living with a constant threat of violence overhead change your behavior?
3. According to the U.S. Department of Defense's plan for securing Afghanistan:  
"The United States' vital national interest in Afghanistan is to ensure that Afghan territory is never again used as a safe haven from which terrorists can attack the United States, our Allies, or our interests abroad. Accordingly, the primary objective for Afghanistan under the President's South Asia Strategy is to support a durable political settlement that ends the war and mitigates terrorist threats emanating from Afghanistan" ("[Enhancing Security and Stability In Afghanistan](#)").

How does the film challenge a perspective of foreign intervention in Afghanistan from eliminating those threatening the nation?

4. How did the film challenge or affirm your perspective on justice in warfare?
5. How does the film prove that humans create war?

1. What did you learn from the film that you wish everyone knew? What would change if everyone knew it?
2. If you were going to tell a friend about the film, what would you say?
3. Change in perspective: How did what you learned in the film change, challenge, or affirm your perspective on (themes)?
