## **Subject Discussion Guide**

How to Use this Guide: If you watched the film with a group, use these questions to guide a conversation about the film. If you watched it alone, write down your answers to these questions to reflect on the film.

## First Impressions

- 1. In a few words, how did the film make you feel?
- 2. What aspects of the film surprised you? What aspects of the film were familiar?
- 3. Was there a moment in the film that you found particularly inspiring or disturbing? What was it about that moment that moved you?
- 4. Was there any story that resonated with you the most?
- 5. Did a particular subject speak to you?

## Reflection

- 1. Is Subject a film that addresses human rights issues? If so, what were the human rights issues being shown in the film?
- 2. How did the stories being told change your perspective on these issues?
- 3. Does the storyteller/ story director have the power to create the story in their image?
- 4. How do we give subjects more agency in the documentary process?
- 5. Have subjects changed over the years?
- 6. Have the lines between what's real and what's not in documentary story-telling become intertwined?

## Connection

- 1. What did you learn from the film that you wish everyone knew? What would change if everyone knew it?
- 2. If you were going to tell a friend about the film, what would you say?
- 3. How did what you learned in the film change, challenge, or affirm your perspective on human rights?
- 4. How does identity shape our understanding of human rights?
